Five Chevy Chase Circle To Be Setting For Spring Gala Champagne Supper

The Chevy Chase Historical Society is delighted to announce that it will hold its annual Spring Gala Champagne Supper on Sunday, April 27, from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. The gala will be hosted by Mr. and Mrs. William Maloni in their gracious home at 5 Chevy Chase Circle.

The property once was the site of a one story school house, built in 1893. The home was owned by All Saints Church from 1949 to 1977, and served as the rectory for All Saints. It is built in the Craftsman style, with stucco walls on the first floor and wood shingles on the second. The rear yard features a spacious terrace, pergola and lap pool. The house,


with its gabled slate roof, presides over a century-old stand of boxwood that is familiar to all who travel about Chevy Chase Circle.

RECENT ACQUISITIONS


This is the debut of "Recent Acquisitions," which will be a regular feature in the newsletter, describing documents and other items that are acquired for the society's Archives and Research Center.

In recent months, CCHS has added the following material to its Archives and Research Center.

- A quart-size milk bottle from Wise Brothers Chevy Chase Dairy. It is made of pressed glass, with a picture of a mother giving a baby a bottle on the back. It was donated by Sylvia Jones, whose neighbor found it in her back yard 40 years ago.
- •Items donated by Margaret Kranking that pertain to the Tracewell family, including family photographs, letters to the *Evening Star* about columnist Charles E. Tracewell at the time of his death, the <u>Star</u> obituaries regarding Charles Tracewell and his father Robert, clippings of Charles Tracewell's "This 'n That" column, his draft card, and a plaque awarded to Cuba Tracewell by the Village of Martin's Additions.
- •A small catalogue from the Chevy Chase Country Day School that was run by Stanwood Cobb at his home at 17 Grafton Street. It was donated by Gail Redmond, librarian of the Historical Society of Washington, D.C. This acquisition is significant because, although CCHS has many of Cobb's books, and knows of the school, we have never had access to a good description of it before.
- A 1988 volume of working papers from John Kay, former manager of the Village of Martin's Additions.

Now that the CCHS has an official office and is able to store and preserve records, the "house research committee" is welcoming donations of oral histories, maps, and records pertaining to the development and buildings in the area. GALA EVENING AND "AVALON COMMUNITY DAY" TO CELEBRATE REOPENING OF AVALON THEATER

The gallant uphill fight to save Chevy Chase's 1923 Avalon Theater has become a victory. The theater, now undergoing extensive restoration, will reopen in March to appropriate fanfare.

This reversal of fortune is due to a superbly successful partnership between new lessee Doug Jemal of Douglas Devlopment, and the grassroots Avalon Theater Project led by Chevy Chase, D.C. resident Bob Zich. Individual, corporate, and foundation contributions of \$300,000, and Jemal's generous support, are making possible the elegant period design and outfitting of the theater's interior (with state of the art projection and sound equipment), revelation of its handsome original exterior, and its reopening as a movie house.

The Theater Project will hold a pre-opening event for those who helped raise funds by purchasing seats for the theater. Every seat has been sold, except for a handful in the small upstairs theater. Each bears a plaque, worded by the purchaser(s). Some plaques bear the purchasers' names, some are in memory of others, including one commemorating Rock Hudson and Doris Day, and one memorializes a couple's first date (at the Avalon, of course).


A VIP opening is slated for Thursday, March 27, for the media to visit the theater and see artists doing finishing touches, and with an evening movie screening for major contributors and District officials. On Sunday, March 30, from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., the Theater Project will hold a celebratory "Avalon Community Day," as a thank you to the Chevy Chase community. Children through seniors are welcome at this free event. It will feature tours, a lecture, exhibits, other activities, and free ice cream from Ben and Jerry's and food from Chipotle, to introduce the community to its reopened theater.

On June 1, the project will hold a gala fundraising event that will start at the theater in the early evening with a movie screening, then move to the atrium of Chevy Chase Pavillion. Attendance is open to the public, but limited to the theater's seating capacity of approximately 440, so early ticket purchase is encouraged.

JEWEL AT THROAT OF CITY TO BE RESTORED TO FORMER LUSTER

Wonderful news! The United States Park Service has commenced work on restoring the massive destruction to the fountain basin, benches, and flower beds in Chevy Chase Circle. The damage was inflicted by three major automobile accidents at the circle, the first of which occurred in January 2001.

The destruction has been particularly disheartening to Chevy Chase residents, as the circle's fountain recently had been refurbished, and the surrounding area replanted with flowering trees, azaleas, and roses, by the Friends of Chevy Chase Circle. Ms. Barbara Price had brought together the United States Park Service, CCHS, the Garden Club of Chevy Chase, and Chevy Chase Village to form the Friends. Chevy Chase Bank, the Chevy Chase Land Company, Clyde's of Chevy Chase, and CCHS, as well as many individuals in the community, had contributed funds to the effort.

The circle is one of a number of points of entry into the District of Columbia that were officially marked and ornamentally distinguished in the first half of the twentieth century. When the Newlands fountain was dedicated at a public ceremony in 1933, the Garden Club of America presented two engraved obelisks to serve as entrance markers. The markers celebrated the bicentennial of George Washington's birth.

In1990, the Chevy Chase Land Company commemorated its centennial by placement of a plaque announcing the company's rededication of the circle and restoration of the fountain. For many years, the markers stood on the triangles of land on Connecticut Avenue at the (opposite) Maryland and District sides of the circle, until one marker was lost and the other damaged.

Now the markers have been recovered and repaired by the father-son team of Constantine and Andy Seferlis, with generous contributions from the Garden Club of Chevy Chase and other contributors. The Park Service has decided the safest place for the markers will be between the azaleas and the inner walkway around the fountain. One will stand on the east side of the fountain, the other on the west. Their placement is planned for late spring, following repair of the broken flagstones in the walkways.

The Park Service has installed a safety fence around the area of damage. According to Ms. Cindy Cox of the Park Service, new cap stones are being made for the fountain rim. On-site work will proceed as weather permits. Ms. Cox believes that the majority of the masonry work will be completed by spring. A new pool liner for the fountain basin will need the proper amount of dry weather to cure, and this could cause some delay. The Park Service probably will replace the missing trees, azaleas, and roses in early spring as well. The Service plans to place protective posts or "bollards" among the azaleas to help protect the benches and fountain from further automotive intrusions.
